### FROM THE ADMINISTRATOR'S DESK

**INSURANCE ENDORSEMENTS** – I want to remind Town ratepayers of three particular property insurance endorsements that I am <u>strongly</u> suggesting everyone should have.

- 1) Sewer Backup Coverage
- **2) Service Line Coverage** (for water and sewer line issues)
- 3) Volunteer Firefighting Coverage

It is imperative that you double check with your insurance broker to make sure these endorsements are added onto your policy. Not everyone gets their insurance in Strasbourg. We have seen cases where insurance has been purchased in Regina, and the Regina insurance brokers are unaware of some of these endorsements, especially Volunteer Firefighting Coverage. In the City of Regina, ratepayers' taxes pay for fire call-outs, so you do not receive a bill when the City of Regina Fire Department attends your property. In Strasbourg, and other small towns, if the volunteer Fire Department attends your property, there is a substantial call-out fee (\$3,000+) that is billed to you. If you have the proper endorsements and enough of a limit (sometimes call-out fees are higher because additional fire departments attend), then you can submit said bill to your insurance for payment. If you do not have the proper endorsement on your policy, or you do not have enough of a limit, you will have to pay the Town out of pocket for this call-out fee. Further, if the call-out fee remains unpaid, the Town has the ability under Section 369 of *The Municipalities Act* to add it to the property owner's taxes.

These endorsements are a minimal charge in relation to the headache it will save you in the future.

**TOWN VANDALISM & MISCHIEF** – Over the last couple of months, there have been many different incidents of vandalism and mischief throughout the community, including the unfortunate destruction of the slide at the Tot Park behind the Last Mountain Pioneer Home. As well, there have been reports of kids riding and ramping bikes on the retaining wall on Main Street, which is causing the wall to break, and now, the Town will have to replace it.

If you aware of any incidents of vandalism or mischief, regardless of the size or nature of the event, please report to the RCMP. The more incidents that are reported, the more the RCMP will patrol and be visible in our community.

## RECYCLING CHANGES

Re: Single Stream Recycling

Dear Customer,

The recent changes in the recycling marketplace have created a huge impact across the globe, negatively affecting commodity prices and the movement of material to end destinations.

There have been many mentions in the media and across social media sites this past year, detailing the issues currently faced by material recovery facilities and municipal recycling programs.

In order to continue providing service, it is now necessary to limit the material being placed into the bins for recycling. Effective immediately these items will no longer be accepted:

• Food Containers labelled as #1



Film plastic (plastic bags and stretch wrap)

Thank you for your cooperation in making these changes

Loraas Disposal

You may be already aware of this notice, but Loraas Disposal Ltd., along with Crown Shred Recycling, is no longer accepting plastic bags and stretch wrap, as well as plastics labelled as #1. Typically, #1 plastics are food containers, such as ketchup bottles, fruit containers, salad dressing bottles, etc. You will have to check for this symbol  $\Rightarrow$ 

If you have thrown out these items in your blue bin, do not stress. Crown Shred will sort them out at their depot. Going forward, these items are to be disposed of in your grey garbage bin.

The Town is disappointed in this change, and we hope that other solutions will be brought forward by higher levels of government in the coming months to combat this issue.

### **ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT NEWS**

The Town Council passed a motion in May to lower the cost of the residential lots in the new subdivision on Maple Street from 35,000.00 to 10,000.00 in an effort to spur development. Each lot is 60 ft x 120 ft and are fully serviced. Since this announcement, two lots have deposits on them, and there have been several interested inquiries. Currently, there are nine lots left, including two walk-out lots.

At the same meeting, the Council passed a comprehensive economic development tax incentive policy, which is available to view on the Town's website. There are tax exemptions available for those who decide to build new homes and businesses, demolish old buildings, as well as build on infill lots for both residential and commercial properties. # SASKALERT APP

We are still strongly encouraging residents of Town to **download the FREE SaskAlert app** on their Android devices or iPhones. SaskAlert is the Government of Saskatchewan's emergency public alerting program that

provides critical information on emergencies in real time, so you can take action to protect yourself, your family, and your property.



The Town used SaskAlert

in May when there was a town-wide boil water advisory, and we will continue to use it for such events, however, the Emergency Management Organization (EMO) Committee will still continue to provide door to door notices about Precautionary Drinking Water Advisories (PDWAs).
