NEW MONTHLY FEATURE

DID YOU KNOW?

Town Council believes that transparency and knowing the factual information builds cooperative spirit, community well being, and strong community pride in all of us. With this in mind, we are starting a new feature this month called "DID YOU KNOW" that will have facts, trivia, interesting data, and information about Strasbourg. We as Council feel this will be helpful for all in understanding how and why decisions are made, and getting to know your great Town.

A strong community is beneficial to all of us and we have so much to be proud of. Strasbourg is fantastic with many services and offerings that we want everyone to know about. So take a Spotlight with you to share with family and friends. Talk about your Town, and if you have a question, drop it off at the Town Office and we will try our best to provide an answer.

#1 - Did You Know...

That since 2020, the Town of Strasbourg has removed a total of 109 elm trees that were infected with Dutch Elm Disease (DED)? Of those 109 trees, 75 of them were Town (public) trees with 43 of them from the Lions Park. This equates to over 9% of our entire tree canopy having been removed in six years, and over \$125,000 spent in inspections, removals, and stump grinding. Sadly, there still over 180 public elm trees left in the Town of Strasbourg (this does not include any privately owned elms). Due to the severity of DED in our geographical region, and no effective, long-term treatment for the disease, the remainder of all our elms will likely die within the next several years. Elms make up approximately 30% of our entire urban forest, so the Town is implementing an urban forestry planting strategy to help offset the trees that are being removed. We have stopped testing and inspecting for DED, and are only removing trees that we know are fully dead in an effort to redirect funds to planting, rather than attempting preventative removal, which has proved ineffective.

DID YOU KNOW CONTINUED...

#2 - Did You Know...

That the Town of Strasbourg has had 21 mayors since its incorporation in 1907? The last 35 years have been served by only four mayors, which speaks to the dedication and long-tenure of those elected officials.

#3 - Did You Know...

That the Town of Strasbourg has 103 streetlights and it cost over \$17,000.00 annually to run them? Most of the streetlights have been converted to LED by SaskPower.

#4 - Did You Know...

The average water break cost is approximately \$10,000.00? Infrastructure repairs can vary due to size and severity, with some as low as \$2,500.00 and others as high as \$20,000.00. The Town has invested substantial funds over the years to replace the utility infrastructure on entire blocks, including water and sewer mains, service connections, and hydrants. Last year we saw our lowest amount of water breaks in the last 15 years at only five. Previously, we would typically experience between 12-18 breaks annually.

More TOWN NEWS



The Town has recently engaged Green Drop Tree Care to do a comprehensive tree inventory and tree replacement plan for our community. We were successful in receiving 90% of a \$79,000.00 grant through the Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM) Growing Communities Canopies Fund to do this project. This project is on the heels of another grant we received from FCM in 2025 for \$25,000.00 to plant 50 trees in the Lions Park and on the boulevards. The remainder of the trees from this grant will be planted in July!

A LITTLE STRASBOURG HISTORY...

The earliest settlers came to this area in 1884. The area was settled by German pioneers. The Town was originally spelled Strassburg, “Strass” meaning street and “Burg” meaning castles. The name was changed by Canada's geography department to the French spelling of Strasbourg in 1919 following World War I. The Town was officially incorporated on July 1, 1907.

Question 4 – Priority Locations for New and Replacement Trees

Strasbourg’s tree inventory shows that most public trees are located along boulevards and in parks, while some streets, civic areas, and community spaces have fewer trees or opportunities to replace trees that have been lost. Identifying priority locations will help the Town focus future planting where trees can provide the greatest benefits, including shade, improved neighbourhood appearance, stronger canopy coverage, and better long-term resilience.

Question 6 – Digital Tree Inventory

The Town still relies on a paper-based tree inventory, which makes it hard to plan planting, pruning or disease control.
